Whilst your child is in the care of Golftyn CP School we shall do our utmost to provide a secure environment. The safety of the children is paramount; therefore, it is very important that our procedures for drop off and collection of children are clearly known by all parents/carers and are adhered to.

School Grounds and Security

The school grounds are monitored by CCTV camera and are secured by fencing and gates which are locked during school hours.

The school gates will be locked at 9am, children arriving after 9am must be signed in at the school office.

The main school entrance is through the Reception/Office doors which are locked during school hours, office staff will release these doors when required.

Nursery and Under 5's Day care have a separate entrance/exit gate - access via the Main Nursery/ Reception doors is unavailable outside of session times unless in special circumstances and at the discretion of the Nursery Teacher.

Late arrivals enter via the main school entrance and office. Pupils arriving late are signed into the late log.

Toilet facilities

Every area of the school has separate toilets for boys and girls and two unisex assisted toilets. Staff toilets are situated in every area of school and a staff assisted toilet.

Nursery Admission



Pupils are eligible to attend Nursery from September after their 3rd birthday. Applications for pupils to attend Nursery can also be made at any time during the school year after their 3rd birthday.

Reception class Admission

Pupils are eligible to attend Reception class from September after their 4th birthday. Applications for pupils to attend Reception, can also be made at any time during the school year after their 4th birthday.

Other year groups

Applications for all other year groups can be made at any time during the school year



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Additional Learning Needs





If your child should need extra support whilst at Golftyn School please try not to worry — come in and talk it through with our additional needs co-ordinator. This is the teacher with special responsibility for children with additional learning needs who regularly liaises with all class teachers and outside agencies. We also have an additional needs support worker who supports the children where needed.

The school seeks to ensure that all children with additional learning needs, whether physical, intellectual, social or emotional, receive appropriate educational provision and that such provision will enable them to overcome their difficulties as far as possible and develop their maximum potential.

Concern may be expressed regarding a child's specific needs by class teachers within the school or other agencies which may be directly concerned with the child's welfare. The observations of the parents are also very welcome in this respect.

Following a diagnostic period of detailed observation and assessment the individual needs of each child will be considered. It is the policy of the school to pursue additional learning needs through a 'whole school approach'.

Such an approach involves children working to their appropriate level within a classroom situation with 1-1 support or small group tuition outside the classroom. We welcome support and liaison with Parents and Guardians at all times.

It is possible that from time to time it may be deemed necessary to involve various outside agencies as part of the programme of provision. Such agencies could include:-

- School Nurse
- Educational Psychologist
- Speech Therapist

Regular review meetings are held, involving all parties concerned, to assess and monitor progress and establish new targets.

Golftyn is an Autism Aware and Dyslexia Friendly School. We aim to provide a learning environment which enables every child to maximise his or her full potential.

The more able and talented child has as much right to additional learning needs provision.

Pupils whose work in a particular curriculum area is far above the remainder of his/her age group should be identified and appropriate provision provided.






Our School Aim is:








Digital Learning and ICT





Digital learning at Golftyn CP equips pupils with the skills they will need to safely engage in the digital world they are entering.



The DCF is now one of the three statutory cross-curricular elements of the Curriculum for Wales.

We are now implementing technology into our pedagogy to support our pupils development and understanding of how technology can be used with purpose.



At Golftyn CP it is vital that all our pupils have equity in the learning opportunities they have in our school. For this reason all pupils have access to the same standard of digital devices,

we make use of Wales' Hwb platform to support our learners with the same digital programmes and apps, We have ensured there has been the same level of training and support for class teachers to enable them to deliver the learning opportunities for pupils to a progressive standard.



Through the use of the Hwb learning platform we have the tools required, to support our pupils in developing their understanding of an array of apps and tools.

We make use of the SAMR model to help understand how the technology can enhance the learning experiences of our pupils.

Through the use of digital portfolios pupils can curate their digital creations and reflect on their learning against the four purposes.

With the use of the Hwb tracking/mapping tool staff can identify elements of the DCF they have covered and in which of the AoLEs, to allow them to plan future activities to allow pupils a scope of application.



In order to equip our pupils with the digital skills they will inevitably need in the future; we need to provide purposeful learning activities for them the apply their understanding.

Our pupils need opportunities to learn how to make use of the apps & tools available to them; and then have the chance to use their own creativity in choosing how to show their learning.

Google for Education Reference School

We make use of the Google Workspace for Education Tools as our primary digital learning platform. Starting in year 1, as pupils progress through the school the complexity of these tools is increased, and by the time they enter year 3, they have a sound base for e-portfolios.


Through the use of Google sites, we share a template with our learners to ensure that their portfolio is shared by them and is then transferable to their secondary school in Wales.

The way we use our e-portfolios allows pupils to explain what they have gained from their learning experiences, they have the ability to share them with a wider audience and understand the process of creating and documenting their achievements in what we see as the future of a CV.

PE

Children in Golftyn will enjoy a rich variety of experiences in Physical Education.

Opportunities will be provided which will enable them to plan, participate in and evaluate work appropriate to their age and their needs.

Gaining knowledge and understanding, developing a range of social skills are considered important aspects of Physical Education, as well as improving the physical skills, health and fitness of our children.

Additionally we will encourage everyone in our care to adopt a lifelong commitment to a healthy, active and enjoyable lifestyle.

Sports teams



Golftyn has built up an excellent sporting reputation. Our teams participate in tournaments, events and festivals.

Teachers from all areas of the school also support the children with opportunities to develop their skills and understanding of rules and tactics by delivering after school clubs.

Religious Education and Collective Worship

Religious Education forms part of the curriculum and pupils take part in a daily act of collective worship, which is broadly Christian.

Local clergy visit the school and we visit local churches to take part in religious services on a regular basis.

Welsh



At Golftyn CP, we have a keen interest in promoting the Welsh language and Welsh culture within our school.

As part of the National Curriculum, Welsh is taught as a second language to all pupils. Our aim is to enable the children to communicate simply and effectively in the Welsh language with an increasing level of understanding, confidence and fluency, and to encourage the learning of Welsh across the curriculum. We encourage a Welsh ethos in our day-to-day routines and work hard to create a bilingual learning environment.

Welsh Language Development

We are committed to encouraging pupils and teachers to use the Welsh language in and around the school and Welsh is learnt as a second language in all classrooms. Classes have pupils who act as a Helpwyr Heddiw, reinforcing Welsh language patterns from the language continuum booklet and encouraging others to ask and answer questions in Welsh, whilst across the school the use of 'Tocyn laiths' help to promote and encourage pupils' use of the Welsh language. The pupils then have the opportunity to use their Tocyn laith's in the Siop Cymru Cwl once every half term.

Staff within the school use the Welsh language daily as a means of delivering instructions to pupils, as well as using it incidentally throughout the school day, so that pupils become used to hearing and using the Welsh language themselves. We also want Welsh to not only be used within school, but throughout a child's life as well. Providing parents with support to promote Welsh at home helps us achieve this.

Curricwlwm Cymreig

We are very fortunate that here in Wales we have a rich history and culture which we believe should be celebrated. Wherever possible, topics will incorporate aspects of Welsh life which celebrate Wales and Welsh culture. As part of the curriculum, we also endeavour to develop an awareness of the cultural heritage of Wales through stories of historical legends. Our locality ensures a deeper study of our Welsh heritage. We actively promote an awareness and pride in our Welsh culture and our heritage in order to establish a genuine sense of Cynefin, through our curriculum and community experiences. Stimulating topics and interesting materials are used to encourage the children to communicate with each other through the medium of Welsh in three attainment targets – oracy, reading and writing. Learners are given opportunities to work as a class, in pairs and with adults and to extend their linguistic ability in Welsh as they pass through the primary school. They are encouraged to develop new sentence patterns, extend their vocabulary and use different tenses and persons of the verb in a variety of situations.

Cymraeg at Golftyn

The Criw Cymraeg are a vital part of the pupil voice groups at Golftyn and have been busy over the last year working towards the Cymraeg Campus Silver award. The Criw Cymraeg meet weekly after school to work on targets and have vital jobs to do during the school week. They are on the yard daily playing Welsh yard games and are an example to the pupils at school.

Cymraeg is important every day at Golftyn but each year we have an annual Welsh Week to celebrate our cultuture and to promote the use of Welsh at school. Each class has a week off timetable where pupils have the opportunity to experience exciting, engaging activities through the medium of Welsh. We have visitors from the Urdd, Menter laith and the company 'Mewn Cymeriad' who visit us regularly throughout the year. The main celebration during the week is our school Eisteddfod. The pupils have the opportunity to take part in Welsh competitions such as singing, reciting, art work as we celebrate Dydd Gwyl Dewi together.

Relationships and Sexuality Education

INFORMATION FOR PARENTS/CARERS









Relationships and Sexuality Education (RSE) is mandatory within the Curriculum for Wales 2022.

Our whole school RSE programme is inclusive, holistic, rights and gender equity based and conforms with the National Guidance and Code 2021.

The school acknowledges that parents/carers are essential to the success of our RSE programme. This leaflet outlines some of the broad mandatory content that will be taught within our whole school RSE programme.

Evidence emphasises that children and young people who have received effective early RSE are more likely to keep themselves safe and make informed choices in respect of their health and wellbeing.

In Progression step 1 (from age 3 upwards) Children will:

- Understand diversity of families and relationships and why these are important.
- · Use accurate terminology for all body parts.
- . Be aware of how human bodies change as they grow.
- Understand the importance of personal self-care and hygiene.
- Recognise that everyone's body is unique and special to them.



- Understand everyone's right to privacy, personal boundaries and which parts of the body are private.
- Be able to communicate if someone is touching them in a way that makes them feel uncomfortable.
- Be able to recognise positive and harmful behaviours, including bullying.


In Progression step 2 (from age 7 upwards) Children will:

- Be aware of the characteristics of different families and friendships and their diversity.
- Understand the importance of sex and gender equality.
- Understand different kinds of harmful or abusive behaviour and the role technology can play.
- Develop skills to build consensual relationships and know how to safely respond and report harmful behaviours and relationships offline and online.
- · Understand how to keep safe online.





- Understand how children and young people experience changes during puberty.
- Know how to manage personal self-care and hygiene, including the importance of menstrual well-being.
- Understand how reproductive organs develop in the human body.
- Understanding fertility and the processes of reproduction..
- Recognise the process of pregnancy and birth.



Forest School



'Forest School is an inspirational process that offers children, young people and adults, regular opportunities to achieve, and develop self-confidence through hands on learning experiences in a local woodland environment. Forest School sessions are held in a woodland based learning environment that is complementary, not separate, to learning in a traditional classroom or school grounds environment. Sessions are not timetable or workbook led but driven by the learners themselves, drawing on their interests and imagination. Through carefully structured sessions with supportive intervention by qualified leaders, Forest School can bring learning to life in a real and tangible context.'









We have a designated Forest school leader in school.

Sessions are held in our forest school areas and two outdoor classrooms within the school grounds. Older pupils are also taken for sessions at Wepre Park in Connah's Quay.



Pupil and Family Wellbeing



We have a dedicated Pupil and Family Wellbeing Team.

Through conversations with parents and carers, teacher updates, our own well-being surveys and monitoring, we are able to keep track of how our pupils are getting on and identify when additional support may be beneficial.

Though not exhaustive, below are examples of some of the support available for our pupils who are struggling with emotional, social or mental health challenges, all delivered in-house by our trained well-being team.



The team can also provide advice, support and information to the children and families within our school community and can help with any worries in relation to children's education, attendance, behaviour, attitude to learning and general wellbeing.

Someone to talk to if **you** need it, in school hours for a face to face chat or via the phone if preferred.

Charging and Remission Policy



In accordance with the Education Act 1988, the Governing Body has a duty to develop and publish a Charging Policy for the school.

Parents/carers are asked to make a voluntary contribution towards the cost of transport to swimming lessons.

Introduction

- The Governing Body recognises the valuable contribution that the wide range of additional activities, including trips, clubs and residential
 experiences can make towards students' education.
- The Governing Body aims to promote and provide such activities both as part of a broad and balanced curriculum for the students of the school and as additional optional activities.
- The Governors wish to ensure that all students have access to all areas of the life of the school regardless of the parents' ability to pay.

Charging for Visits

- Education provided wholly or mainly during school hours is deemed free for students at the school. The school may not impose a charge on
 parents for any visit during school hours. The Headteacher may however, ask for a voluntary contribution. The visit may not proceed without
 sufficient funding.
- Parents should be aware that the contribution is not compulsory, and the children of parents who do not contribute may not be discriminated
 against. It is permissible to ask parents to contribute more than the minimum amount in order to subsidise those students whose parents have
 not contributed.
- The school may, however, charge parents for board and lodging on residential visits as well as the full costs when a visit is deemed to be an optional extra. An optional extra: * Falls wholly or mainly outside school hours * Does not form part of the Curriculum for Wales
- Permission should be obtained from the parents to meet the costs of an optional extra before the visit is planned in detail.
- Charging parents for an optional extra visit may not include an element of subsidy in respect of other students whose families do not meet the full charge.

Remissions

 Financial support may be given to families who receive free school meals or who are having financial difficulties, at the discretion of the Headteacher.

Other Activities - The Governing Body reserves the right to make a charge in the following circumstances:

- Instrumental Music Tuition a charge will be made by FCC but school can pay this, at the discretion of the Headteacher, from the Pupil Deprivation Grant if the child meets the grant criteria e.g. free school meals.
- The cost of materials, ingredients (or require them to be provided) if the parents have indicated that they wish to own the finished product.
- The Headteacher and Governors will ensure that no child is excluded from participating in the activities because of non-payment of the contribution, but it is necessary for a substantial number of parents to contribute before the activity can go ahead.
- The Headteacher and Governors will consider sympathetically cases of genuine financial need and remit charges where appropriate.

<u>Debt Collection -</u> If a residential trip is not paid in full by the deadline given pupils will not be able to attend and may lose any monies paid. If a payment is not made by the parent/guardian's bank after the trip has taken place parents/guardians will be contacted by letter and telephone to obtain payment. If payment is not received pupils will not be able to attend any future residential trips.

Matters of Concern



At Golftyn School, communication is a key priority. Teachers are available without an appointment in the mornings or after school to discuss your child.

Nursery, Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 teachers are available from 8:40am to 8:50am or after 3pm.

Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 teachers are available from 8:40am to 8:50am or 3:10pm.

Please appreciate that teachers are unable to discuss matters at length between 9am and 3-3:10pm as it is the teachers priority to be in class with the children during these times.


We have a three tier communication structure for you to use to address any issues or concerns regarding your child:

- ⇒ **Step 1** Speak to class teacher as they are the person who spends most time with your child and is responsible on a daily basis for their education and welfare.
- ⇒ **Step 2** Assistant Head teachers of each area are there to help you with more serious matters or matters that you feel are not being resolved.
- ⇒ **Step 3** Head teacher, Mrs Cooper is available where possible without an appointment at any time during the school day to discuss confidential or serious matters or any concerns which you feel have not been resolved with in Step 1 and Step 2.

Please apply for free school meals if you think that your child may be entitled, even though their meals at school are free of charge.

Applying for free school meals can entitle you to: school uniform grants, FREE breakfast club and discounted school trips *at the school's discretion.

Drinks Please provide your child with a drink of water every day, in a container with a sports cap.


All pupils are supervised at lunch times by Senior Mid-day Supervisors and Mid Day Supervisors.
